Central America Support

Lack of economic opportunity, combined with violence and corruption, lead many Central Americans to flee their homes – putting pressure on the U.S. southern border.

The Bush Institute's Central America
Prosperity Project addressed the urgent
need for continued U.S. support in Central
America, beginning with a conversation
between Representatives Will Hurd
and Henry Cuellar and continuing with
panel conversations urging government
cooperation and outlining a path toward
economic growth.

In conjunction with the conversations, the Bush Institute released a new report, A Digital Strategy for Competitiveness and Integration in the North Triangle and engaged leaders in Guatemala, Honduras, and El Salvador in advancing those policy solutions.

Women's Rights in Afghanistan

Building upon their longstanding partnership to promote women's rights in Afghanistan, the Atlantic Council and the Bush Institute hosted virtual conversations in October with First Lady of Afghanistan Rula Ghani and Mrs. Bush.

The Third Annual Forum on Leadership

The third annual Forum on Leadership was hosted in September at the Bush Center, highlighting those that showcase America at its best – from everyday citizens who are doing extraordinary things to optimistic leaders who are answering the call to serve across this country and around the world. Wendy Kopp, Founder of Teach for America and CEO and Co-Founder of Teach for All, received the 2020 George W. Bush Medal for Distinguished Leadership. Liberty in North Korea received the Bush Institute Citation, and Michael Sorrell, President of Paul Quinn College in Dallas, received our Trailblazer Citation.

Moving Ahead

When the pandemic hit, Bush Institute offices closed but the important work didn't slow. From lesson plans based on Marvel movies for parents teaching at home, to analysis of COVID-19's long-term impact on education, to breakdowns of potential economic impact of COVID relief packages, Bush Institute experts continued addressing pressing challenges of the day. 235 op-eds were published and readership of Bush Institute content on our website increased by 35% over the previous year.

The Catalyst tackled pressing policy issues in 2020: the federal debt, the racial equity gap in education, and the looming challenges from China. But it also took a moment in the spring to highlight bright spots as the world battled a pandemic: stories of kindness, determination, and innovation from those working to help their fellow citizens.

In the early months of the pandemic, *The Strategerist* podcast focused on leaders working to make a difference, such as Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation CEO Mark Suzman, who predicted the rapid vaccine development, and problem solvers Anurag Jain & Patrick Brandt, who paired out-of-work hospitality workers with nonprofits through Get Shift Done.




2020 USES*
